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15 This matter comes before the Court on "Defendants' Joint Motion for Protective Order."  
16 Dkt. # 66. The motion is unopposed. The Court therefore ORDERS as follows:

17  
18 **PROTECTIVE ORDER**

19 **1. Purposes and Limitations**

20 Discovery in this action is likely to involve production of confidential, proprietary, or  
21 private information for which special protection may be warranted. The parties acknowledge  
22 that this agreement is consistent with LCR 26(c). It does not confer blanket protection on all  
23 disclosures or responses to discovery, the protection it affords from public disclosure and use  
24 extends only to the limited information or items that are entitled to confidential treatment under  
25 the applicable legal principles, and it does not presumptively entitle parties to file confidential  
26 information under seal.

1 **2. “Confidential” Material**

2 “Confidential” material shall include the following documents and tangible things  
3 produced or otherwise exchanged: [The parties must include a list of specific documents such as  
4 “company’s customer list” or “plaintiff’s medical records;” do not list broad categories of  
5 documents such as “sensitive business material”] American Tire Distributors, Inc.’s (“ATD”)  
6 and Mastech, Inc.’s (“Mastech”) financial records; personnel, financial and personal information  
7 regarding non-party individuals; pricing information; and technical, non-public business  
8 information regarding programming and network engineering services.

9 **3. Scope**

10 The protections conferred by this agreement cover not only confidential material (as  
11 defined above), but also (1) any information copied or extracted from confidential material;  
12 (2) all copies, excerpts, summaries, or compilations of confidential material; and (3) any  
13 testimony, conversations, or presentations by parties or their counsel that might reveal  
14 confidential material. However, the protections conferred by this agreement do not cover  
15 information that is in the public domain or becomes part of the public domain through trial or  
16 otherwise.

17 **4. Access to and Use of Confidential Material**

18 **4.1 Basic Principles.** A receiving party may use confidential material that is  
19 disclosed or produced by another party or by a non-party in connection with this case only for  
20 prosecuting, defending, or attempting to settle this litigation. Confidential material may be  
21 disclosed only to the categories of persons and under the conditions described in this agreement.  
22 Confidential material must be stored and maintained by a receiving party at a location and in a  
23 secure manner that ensures that access is limited to the persons authorized under this agreement.

24 **4.2 Disclosure of “CONFIDENTIAL” Information or Items.** Unless otherwise  
25 ordered by the court or permitted in writing by the designating party, a receiving party may  
26 disclose any confidential material only to:  
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1 (a) the receiving party's counsel of record in this action, as well as employees  
2 of counsel to whom it is reasonably necessary to disclose the information for this litigation;

3 (b) the officers, directors, and employees (including in house counsel) of the  
4 receiving party to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this litigation, unless the parties  
5 agree that a particular document or material produced is for Attorney's Eyes Only and is so  
6 designated;

7 (c) experts and consultants to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for  
8 this litigation and who have signed the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound"  
9 (Exhibit A);

10 (d) the court, court personnel, and court reporters and their staff;

11 (e) copy or imaging services retained by counsel to assist in the duplication of  
12 confidential material, provided that counsel for the party retaining the copy or imaging service  
13 instructs the service not to disclose any confidential material to third parties and to immediately  
14 return all originals and copies of any confidential material;

15 (f) during their depositions, witnesses in the action to whom disclosure is  
16 reasonably necessary and who have signed the "Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound"  
17 (Exhibit A), unless otherwise agreed by the designating party or ordered by the court. Pages of  
18 transcribed deposition testimony or exhibits to depositions that reveal confidential material must  
19 be separately bound by the court reporter and may not be disclosed to anyone except as permitted  
20 under this agreement;

21 (g) the author or recipient of a document containing the information or a  
22 custodian or other person who otherwise possessed or knew the information.

23 **4.3 Filing Confidential Material.** Before filing confidential material or discussing  
24 or referencing such material in court filings, the filing party shall confer with the designating  
25 party to determine whether the designating party will remove the confidential designation,  
26 whether the document can be redacted, or whether a motion to seal or stipulation and proposed  
27 order is warranted. Local Civil Rule 5(g) sets forth the procedures that must be followed and the  
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1 standards that will be applied when a party seeks permission from the court to file material under  
2 seal.

## 3 **5. Designating Protected Material**

4 **5.1 Exercise of Restraint and Care in Designating Material for Protection.** Each  
5 party or non-party that designates information or items for protection under this agreement must  
6 take care to limit any such designation to specific material that qualifies under the appropriate  
7 standards. The designating party must designate for protection only those parts of material,  
8 documents, items, or oral or written communications that qualify, so that other portions of the  
9 material, documents, items, or communications for which protection is not warranted are not  
10 swept unjustifiably within the ambit of this agreement.

11 Mass, indiscriminate, or routinized designations are prohibited. Designations that are  
12 shown to be clearly unjustified or that have been made for an improper purpose (*e.g.*, to  
13 unnecessarily encumber or delay the case development process or to impose unnecessary  
14 expenses and burdens on other parties) expose the designating party to sanctions.

15 If it comes to a designating party's attention that information or items that it designated  
16 for protection do not qualify for protection, the designating party must promptly notify all other  
17 parties that it is withdrawing the mistaken designation.

18 **5.2 Manner and Timing of Designations.** Except as otherwise provided in this  
19 agreement (see, *e.g.*, second paragraph of section 5.2(a) below), or as otherwise stipulated or  
20 ordered, disclosure or discovery material that qualifies for protection under this agreement must  
21 be clearly so designated before or when the material is disclosed or produced.

22 **(a) Information in documentary form:** (*e.g.*, paper or electronic documents  
23 and deposition exhibits, but excluding transcripts of depositions or other pretrial or trial  
24 proceedings), the designating party must affix the word "CONFIDENTIAL" to each page that  
25 contains confidential material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies  
26 for protection, the producing party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (*e.g.*, by  
27 making appropriate markings in the margins).

1           **(b) Testimony given in deposition or in other pretrial or trial**  
2 **proceedings:** the parties must identify on the record, during the deposition, hearing, or other  
3 proceeding, all protected testimony, without prejudice to their right to so designate other  
4 testimony after reviewing the transcript. Any party or non-party may, within 15 days after  
5 receiving a deposition transcript, designate portions of the transcript, or exhibits thereto, as  
6 confidential.

7           **(c) Other tangible items:** the producing party must affix in a prominent  
8 place on the exterior of the container or containers in which the information or item is stored the  
9 word “CONFIDENTIAL.” If only a portion or portions of the information or item warrant  
10 protection, the producing party, to the extent practicable, shall identify the protected portion(s).

11           **5.3 Inadvertent Failures to Designate.** If timely corrected, an inadvertent failure to  
12 designate qualified information or items does not, standing alone, waive the designating party’s  
13 right to secure protection under this agreement for such material. Upon timely correction of a  
14 designation, the receiving party must make reasonable efforts to ensure that the material is  
15 treated in accordance with the provisions of this agreement.

16 **6. Challenging Confidentiality Designations**

17           **6.1 Timing of Challenges.** Any party or non-party may challenge a designation of  
18 confidentiality at any time. Unless a prompt challenge to a designating party’s confidentiality  
19 designation is necessary to avoid foreseeable, substantial unfairness, unnecessary economic  
20 burdens, or a significant disruption or delay of the litigation, a party does not waive its right to  
21 challenge a confidentiality designation by electing not to mount a challenge promptly after the  
22 original designation is disclosed.

23           **6.2 Meet and Confer.** The parties must make every attempt to resolve any dispute  
24 regarding confidential designations without court involvement. Any motion regarding  
25 confidential designations or for a protective order must include a certification, in the motion or in  
26 a declaration or affidavit, that the movant has engaged in a good faith meet and confer  
27 conference with other affected parties in an effort to resolve the dispute without court action.

1 The certification must list the date, manner, and participants to the conference. A good faith  
2 effort to confer requires a face-to-face meeting or a telephone conference.

3 **6.3 Judicial Intervention.** If the parties cannot resolve a challenge without court  
4 intervention, the designating party may file and serve a motion to retain confidentiality under  
5 LCR 7 (and in compliance with LCR 5(g), if applicable). The burden of persuasion in any such  
6 motion shall be on the designating party. Frivolous challenges, and those made for an improper  
7 purpose (*e.g.*, to harass or impose unnecessary expenses and burdens on other parties) may  
8 expose the challenging party to sanctions. All parties shall continue to maintain the material in  
9 question as confidential until the court rules on the challenge.

10 **7. Protected Material Subpoenaed or Ordered Produced in Other Litigation**

11 If a party is served with a subpoena or a court order issued in other litigation that compels  
12 disclosure of any information or items designated in this action as “CONFIDENTIAL,” that  
13 party must:

14 (a) promptly notify the designating party in writing and include a copy of the  
15 subpoena or court order;

16 (b) promptly notify in writing the party who caused the subpoena or order to issue in  
17 the other litigation that some or all of the material covered by the subpoena or order is subject to  
18 this agreement. Such notification shall include a copy of this agreement; and

19 (c) cooperate with respect to all reasonable procedures sought to be pursued by the  
20 designating party whose confidential material may be affected.

21 **8. Unauthorized Disclosure of Protected Material**

22 If a receiving party learns that, by inadvertence or otherwise, it has disclosed confidential  
23 material to any person or in any circumstance not authorized under this agreement, the receiving  
24 party must immediately (a) notify in writing the designating party of the unauthorized  
25 disclosures, (b) use its best efforts to retrieve all unauthorized copies of the protected material,  
26 (c) inform the person or persons to whom unauthorized disclosures were made of all the terms of  
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1 this agreement, and (d) request that such person or persons execute the “Acknowledgment and  
2 Agreement to Be Bound” that is attached hereto as Exhibit A.

3 **9. Inadvertent Production of Privileged or Otherwise Protected Material**

4 When a producing party gives notice to receiving parties that certain inadvertently  
5 produced material is subject to a claim of privilege or other protection, the obligations of the  
6 receiving parties are those set forth in Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(b)(5)(B). This  
7 provision is not intended to modify whatever procedure may be established in an e-discovery  
8 order or agreement that provides for production without prior privilege review. Parties shall  
9 confer on an appropriate non-waiver order under Fed. R. Evid. 502.

10 **10. Non Termination and Return of Documents**

11 Within 60 days after the termination of this action, including all appeals, each receiving  
12 party must return all confidential material to the producing party, including all copies, extracts  
13 and summaries thereof. Alternatively, the parties may agree upon appropriate methods of  
14 destruction.

15 Notwithstanding this provision, counsel are entitled to retain one archival copy of all  
16 documents filed with the court, trial, deposition, and hearing transcripts, correspondence,  
17 deposition and trial exhibits, expert reports, attorney work product, and consultant and expert  
18 work product, even if such materials contain confidential material.

19 The confidentiality obligations imposed by this agreement shall remain in effect until a  
20 designating party agrees otherwise in writing or a court orders otherwise.
