17	Pursuant to 28 U.S.C. § 1746(2), I, Jeffrey Riedinger, hereby declare as follows:				
18	1. I am a Professor of Law and the Vice Provost for Global Affairs at the University of				
19	Washington ("University"), the largest public research university in the Pacific Northwest. I				
20	have personal knowledge of the facts set forth in this declaration and I am competent to testify				
21	about them. I am a graduate of the University's law school and prior to returning to the				
22					
23	University in September 2013, I served for more than 15 years as Assistant Dean, Associate				
24	Dean, and then Dean of International Studies and I	Programs at Michigan State University with

similar responsibilities to those of my current position. I have been engaged in international

research for nearly 40 years with experience in Asia, Africa, Europe, Latin America, and the Middle East.

- 2. As Vice Provost for Global Affairs, I have a leadership and administrative responsibility for the University of Washington's diverse global programming including support for international research, study abroad, student and faculty exchanges, and overseas centers.
- 3. I am aware that President Trump issued a formal proclamation ("Proclamation") on September 24, 2017, placing certain restrictions on the issuance of visas to nationals from eight countries -- Chad, Libya, Somalia, Iran, Yemen, Syria, Venezuela and North Korea. Based upon my review of relevant data, I am aware that the University currently has eight international scholars from Iran who are here on either H-1B or J-1 visas, and one international scholar from Syria who is working here under an H-1B visa (collectively "international scholars"). The following chart shows the visa categories, start and end dates of their immigration status, countries, positions, and fields for all of these international scholars:

These international scholars are engaged in advancing research in highly specialized fields, primarily in medicine and science, and programs of training and mentorship. Even if the visa

restrictions specified in the Proclamation do not directly prevent these international scholars from continuing to work at the University, to the extent they are not able to be visited by friends, and especially by family, because of those restrictions, and to the extent that they are unable to leave the United States for professional and/or personal reasons with any assurance that they will be allowed to return, their ability to effectively carry out their assigned work at the University could be significantly affected. Based on these restrictions, some may choose to leave the University.

4. In addition to the immediate effects of the Proclamation on the current international scholars listed here, I am also concerned about the long-term effects on the University if scholars from the listed countries are unable to obtain visas in the future, or are discouraged from even trying to do so. International scholars from other parts of the world bring an important set of life experiences, academic perspectives and personal viewpoints that greatly enrich our academic community. Our sponsorship of international scholars is founded on the notion that global engagement is crucial to advancing knowledge and preparing future leaders for our increasingly interconnected world. I believe that placing categorical limits or restrictions on the ability of scholars from specified countries to fully participate in the academic life to which they have been recruited threatens to erode an important aspect of our long-standing educational mission.
