ORDER OF REMAND

14 This matter comes before the Court on a “Notice of Removal of Civil Action Under 28
15 U.S.C. 1446(a).” Dkt. # 1. Proceeding *in forma pauperis*, see Dkt. ## 2, 7, litigant dary-gail:
16 riedlinger¹ removed Cause No. 7Z0024207 from the Edmonds Municipal Court, Dkt. # 1. That
17 matter appears to concern a traffic ticket issued by the City of Edmonds to an individual named
18 Dary Gail Riedlinger. Dkt. # 1-2 at 2. In Edmonds Municipal Court, dary-gail: riedlinger filed
19 an answer denying that he was the defendant in that matter, asserting that he was the
20 “Administrator and Attorney-In-Fact for Defendant DARY GAIL RIEDLINGER™ (a juristic
21 person),” and lodging a “Third-Party Complaint” against various individually named defendants
22 Dkt. # 1-2 at 9. Mr. riedlinger removed that matter to this Court. Dkt. # 1.²

26 ² Separately, Mr. riedlinger attempted to remove Edmonds Municipal Court Cause No.
27 7Z0024206, which was docketed in this Court as Case No. MC17-18RSL. On February 27, 2017, the
28 Court denied Mr. riedlinger’s request to remove that matter.

1 It has long been recognized that the Court can *sua sponte* consider the issue of subject-
2 matter jurisdiction at any time during the proceeding. Scholastic Entm't, Inc. v. Fox Entm't
3 Group, Inc., 336 F.3d 982, 985 (9th Cir. 2003); Fed. R. Civ. P. 12(h)(3). The party seeking a
4 federal venue has the burden of establishing this Court's subject-matter jurisdiction. In re
5 Dynamic Random Access Memory (DRAM) Antitrust Litig., 546 F.3d 981, 984 (9th Cir. 2008).
6 Mr. riedlinger alleges that the Court has subject-matter jurisdiction because his defenses in the
7 Municipal Court action are grounded in federal law. Dkt. # 1 at 2; see 28 U.S.C. § 1331; 28
8 U.S.C. § 1442. But for federal subject-matter jurisdiction to exist, a federal question must
9 appear on the face of the complaint. Caterpillar, Inc. v. Williams, 482 U.S. 386, 392 (1987).
10 Federal jurisdiction cannot be based on actual or anticipated defenses. Vaden v. Discover Bank,
11 556 U.S. 49, 60 (2009) (citing Louisville & Nashville R. Co. v. Mottley, 211 U.S. 149, 152
12 (1908)).

13 Moreover, it appears that the Municipal Court action is a criminal matter, not a civil one.
14 See Dkt. # 1-2 at 2. As this Court observed in denying Mr. riedlinger's request to remove a
15 separate criminal action, see supra note 2, federal law allows the removal of state criminal
16 prosecutions "[a]gainst any person who is denied or cannot enforce in the courts of such State a
17 right under any law providing for the equal civil rights of citizens of the United States" 28
18 U.S.C. § 1443(1). Mr. riedlinger makes no effort to show that removal is warranted under this
19 provision.

20 Finally, to the extent Mr. riedlinger argues that federal subject-matter jurisdiction exists
21 due to the federal claims in the third-party complaint he filed in Municipal Court, the Court
22 reminds Mr. riedlinger that only a defendant may remove an action filed in state court. See 28
23 U.S.C. § 1441(a). As third-party plaintiff, Mr. riedlinger may not remove on the basis of his
24 federal claims.

1 For all the foregoing reasons, Mr. riedlinger has failed to meet his burden of establishing
2 the basis of the Court's jurisdiction. This matter is hereby remanded to the Edmonds Municipal
3 Court. Mr. riedlinger's motions for an extension of time (Dkt. # 9) and for default (Dkt. # 10)
4 are DENIED as moot.
