**STIPULATED PROTECTIVE
ORDER¹**

1. PURPOSES, LIMITATIONS AND GOOD CAUSE

1.1 Purposes and Limitations

As the parties have represented that discovery in this action is likely to involve production of confidential, proprietary, or private information for which

This proposed protective order is based on one of the model protective orders provided by Magistrate Judge Jacqueline Chooljian of the Central District of California, and it is substantively identical both to the protective order entered in *Archer, et al. v. Carnival Corporation, et al.*, No. 2:20-cv-04203-RGK-SK (C.D. Cal.) and the proposed protective order filed in *Lindsay, et al. v. Carnival Corporation, et al.*, No. 2:20-cv-00982-TSZ (W.D. Wash.). The parties acknowledge that this agreement is consistent with Local Civil Rule 26(c).

1 special protection from public disclosure and from use for any purpose other than
2 prosecuting this litigation may be warranted, this Court enters the following
3 Protective Order. This Order does not confer blanket protections on all disclosures
4 or responses to discovery. The protection it affords from public disclosure and use
5 extends only to the limited information or items that are entitled to confidential
6 treatment under the applicable legal principles. Further, as set forth in Section 12.3,
7 below, this Protective Order does not entitle the parties to file confidential
8 information under seal. Rather, when the parties seek permission from the court to
9 file material under seal, the parties must comply with Local Civil Rule 5(g) and with
10 any pertinent orders of the assigned District Judge and Magistrate Judge.

11 1.2 Good Cause Statement

12 This action is likely to involve personal medical information, financial
13 records, and trade secrets. In light of the nature of the claims and allegations in this
14 case and the parties' representations that discovery in this case will involve the
15 production of confidential records, and in order to expedite the flow of information,
16 to facilitate the prompt resolution of disputes over confidentiality of discovery
17 materials, to adequately protect information the parties are entitled to keep
18 confidential, to ensure that the parties are permitted reasonable necessary uses of
19 such material in connection with this action, to address their handling of such
20 material at the end of the litigation, and to serve the ends of justice, a protective
21 order for such information is justified in this matter. The parties shall not designate
22 any information/documents as confidential for tactical reasons and without a good
23 faith belief that such information/documents have been maintained in a confidential,
24 non-public manner, and that there is good cause or a compelling reason why it
25 should not be part of the public record of this case.

1.3. Materials Produced May Be Used in the Following Cases

To promote judicial economy and efficiency, materials produced and depositions taken in this litigation maybe shared with counsel in the following cases provided counsel signs this protective order and agrees to be bound by its terms: *Lindsay, et al. v. Carnival Corporation, et al.*, No. 2:20-cv-00982-TSZ (W.D. Wash.) and *Grimms et al. v. Carnival Corporation et al.*, No. 2:21-cv-00311-TSZ (W.D. Wash.).

1.4 Materials Produced in Other Cases

To promote judicial economy and efficiency, the materials produced and depositions taken in the following related cases may be treated as if obtained through discovery in the present litigation, provided counsel signs this protective order and agrees to be bound by its terms: *Lindsay, et al. v. Carnival Corporation, et al.*, No. 2:20-cv-00982-TSZ (W.D. Wash.); *Grimms et al. v. Carnival Corporation et al.*, No. 2:21-cv-00311-TSZ (W.D. Wash.).

The Parties agree that depositions transcripts and exhibits from *Archer et al. v. Carnival Corporation et al.*, No. 2:20-cv-04203-RGK (C.D. Cal.), may be used in the present litigation. Defendants further agree to reproduce in the present litigation the documents that were produced in *Archer et al. v. Carnival Corporation et al.*, No. 2:20-cv-04203-RGK (C.D. Cal.), to the extent those documents were (1) within the custodial files of Holland America Line or Carnival Corporation & plc, and (2) not related solely to the *Archer* plaintiffs (*i.e.*, the “DARC production series”). To the extent that *Archer* production documents are not in the custodial files of Holland America Line or Carnival Corporation & plc, Counsel for Plaintiffs may continue to access those documents that were produced in *Archer* for purposes of requesting that they be reproduced in the present litigation.

2. DEFINITIONS

2.1 Action: The instant action: *Grimms, et al., v. Carnival Corporation, et al.*, No. 2:21-cv-00311-TSZ (W.D. Wash.).

2.2 Challenging Party: a Party or Non-Party that challenges the designation of information or items under this Order.

2.3 “CONFIDENTIAL” Information or Items: information (regardless of how it is generated, stored or maintained) or tangible things that qualify for protection under Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(c), and as specified above in the Good Cause Statement.

2.4 “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” Information or Items: extremely sensitive “CONFIDENTIAL” Information or Items, the disclosure of which to another Party or Non-Party would create a substantial risk of serious harm that could not be avoided by less restrictive means.

2.5 Counsel: Outside Counsel of Record and House Counsel (as well as their support staff).

2.6 Designating Party: a Party or Non-Party that designates information or items that it produces in disclosures or in responses to discovery as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.”

2.7 Disclosure or Discovery Material: all items or information, regardless of the medium or manner in which it is generated, stored, or maintained (including, among other things, testimony, transcripts, and tangible things), that are produced or generated in disclosures or responses to discovery in this matter.

2.8 Expert: a person with specialized knowledge or experience in a matter pertinent to the litigation who has been retained by a Party or its counsel to serve as an expert witness or as a consultant in this Action.

2.9 House Counsel: attorneys who are employees of a party to this Action or its affiliates, including their support staff. House Counsel does not include Outside Counsel of Record or any other outside counsel.

2.10 Non-Party: any natural person, partnership, corporation, association, or other legal entity not named as a Party to this action.

2.11 Outside Counsel of Record: attorneys who are not employees of a party to this Action but are retained to represent or advise a party to this Action and have appeared in this Action on behalf of that party or are affiliated with a law firm which has appeared on behalf of that party, and includes support staff.

2.12 Party: any party to this Action, including all of its officers, directors, employees, consultants, retained experts, and Outside Counsel of Record (and their support staffs).

2.13 Producing Party: a Party or Non-Party that produces Disclosure or Discovery Material in this Action.

2.14 Professional Vendors: persons or entities that provide litigation support services (e.g., photocopying, videotaping, translating, preparing exhibits or demonstrations, and organizing, storing, or retrieving data in any form or medium) and their employees and subcontractors.

2.15 Protected Material: any Disclosure or Discovery Material that is designated as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.”

2.16 Receiving Party: a Party that receives Disclosure or Discovery Material from a Producing Party.

3. SCOPE

The protections conferred by this Order cover not only Protected Material (as defined above), but also (1) any information copied or extracted from Protected Material; (2) all copies, excerpts, summaries, or compilations of Protected Material;

1 and (3) any deposition testimony, conversations, or presentations by Parties or their
 2 Counsel that might reveal Protected Material, other than during a court hearing or at
 3 trial.

4 Any use of Protected Material during a court hearing or at trial shall be
 5 governed by the orders of the presiding judge. This Order does not govern the use
 6 of Protected Material during a court hearing or at trial.

7 4. DURATION

8 Even after final disposition of this litigation, the confidentiality obligations
 9 imposed by this Order shall remain in effect until a Designating Party agrees
 10 otherwise in writing or a court order otherwise directs. Final disposition shall be
 11 deemed to be the later of (1) dismissal of all claims and defenses in this Action, with
 12 or without prejudice; and (2) final judgment herein after the completion and
 13 exhaustion of all appeals, rehearings, remands, trials, or reviews of this Action,
 14 including the time limits for filing any motions or applications for extension of time
 15 pursuant to applicable law.

16 5. DESIGNATING PROTECTED MATERIAL

17 5.1 Exercise of Restraint and Care in Designating Material for Protection.

18 Each Party or Non-Party that designates information or items for protection under
 19 this Order must take care to limit any such designation to specific documents and
 20 things that qualify under the appropriate standards. To the extent that it is not
 21 unreasonably burdensome, the Designating Party should designate for protection
 22 only those parts of material, documents, items, or oral or written communications
 23 that qualify so that other portions of the material, documents, items, or
 24 communications for which protection is not warranted are not swept unjustifiably
 25 within the ambit of this Order.

26 Mass, indiscriminate, or routinized designations are prohibited. Designations
 27 that are shown to be clearly unjustified or that have been made for an improper

purpose (e.g., to unnecessarily encumber the case development process or to impose unnecessary expenses and burdens on other parties) may expose the Designating Party to sanctions.

If it comes to a Designating Party's attention that information or items that it designated for protection do not qualify for protection, that Designating Party must promptly notify all other Parties that it is withdrawing the inapplicable designation.

5.2 Manner and Timing of Designations. Except as otherwise provided in this Order (see, e.g., second paragraph of Section 5.2(a) below), or as otherwise stipulated or ordered, Disclosure or Discovery Material that qualifies for protection under this Order must be clearly so designated before the material is disclosed or produced.

Designation in conformity with this Order requires:

(a) for information in documentary form (e.g., paper or electronic documents, but excluding transcripts of depositions), that the Producing Party affix at a minimum, the legend "CONFIDENTIAL" or "HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS' EYES ONLY" to each page that contains protected material. If only a portion or portions of the material on a page qualifies for protection, the Producing Party also must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by making appropriate markings in the margins), to the extent that it is not unreasonably burdensome to do so.

A Party or Non-Party that makes original documents available for inspection need not designate them for protection until after the inspecting Party has indicated which documents it would like copied and produced. During the inspection and before the designation, all of the material made available for inspection shall be deemed "CONFIDENTIAL." After the inspecting Party has identified the documents it wants copied and produced, the Producing Party must determine which documents, or portions thereof, qualify for protection under this Order. Then,

1 before producing the specified documents, the Producing Party must affix the
 2 “CONFIDENTIAL”, or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES
 3 ONLY” legend to each page that contains Protected Material. If only a portion or
 4 portions of the material on a page qualifies for protection, the Producing Party also
 5 must clearly identify the protected portion(s) (e.g., by making appropriate markings
 6 in the margins), to the extent that it is not unreasonably burdensome to do so

7 (b) for testimony given in depositions, such testimony is preferably
 8 designated as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL -
 9 ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” during the course of the deposition when
 10 appropriate, but nevertheless shall be provisionally designated as
 11 “CONFIDENTIAL” in its entirety until 30 calendar days after receipt of the final
 12 transcript have past (or a date otherwise agreed by the parties), by which time each
 13 Party shall provide to the other Party an identification of any changes or additions to
 14 the portions of the transcript that it designates as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY
 15 CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.” The Parties further agree,
 16 pursuant to Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 30(e), that any deponent may review
 17 and sign their deposition transcript within 30 calendar days of the party receiving
 18 the transcript.

19 (c) for information produced in some form other than documentary and
 20 for any other tangible items, that the Producing Party affix in a prominent place on
 21 the exterior of the container or containers in which the information is stored the
 22 legend “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’
 23 EYES ONLY.” If only a portion or portions of the information warrants protection,
 24 the Producing Party, to the extent practicable, shall identify the protected portion(s),
 25 to the extent that it is not unreasonably burdensome to do so.

26 5.3 Inadvertent Failures to Designate. If timely corrected, an inadvertent
 27 failure to designate qualified information or items does not, standing alone, waive

the Designating Party's right to secure protection under this Order for such material. Upon timely correction of a designation, the Receiving Party must make reasonable efforts to assure that the material is treated in accordance with the provisions of this Order.

6. CHALLENGING CONFIDENTIALITY DESIGNATIONS

6.1 Timing of Challenges. Any Party or Non-Party may challenge a designation of confidentiality at any time that is consistent with the Court's Scheduling Order.

6.2 Meet and Confer. The Challenging Party shall initiate the dispute resolution process under Local Civil Rule 37.

6.3 The burden of persuasion in any such challenge proceeding shall be on the Designating Party. Frivolous challenges, and those made for an improper purpose (e.g., to harass or impose unnecessary expenses and burdens on other parties) may expose the Challenging Party to sanctions. Unless the Designating Party has waived or withdrawn the confidentiality designation, all parties shall continue to afford the material in question the level of protection to which it is entitled under the Producing Party's designation until the Court rules on the challenge.

7. ACCESS TO AND USE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL

7.1 Basic Principles. A Receiving Party may use Protected Material that is disclosed or produced by another Party or by a Non-Party in connection with this Action only for prosecuting, defending, or attempting to settle this Action. Such Protected Material may be disclosed only to the categories of persons and under the conditions described in this Order. When the Action has been terminated, a Receiving Party must comply with the provisions of Section 13 below.

1 Protected Material must be stored and maintained by a Receiving Party at a
2 location and in a secure manner that ensures that access is limited to the persons
3 authorized under this Order.

4 7.2 Disclosure of “CONFIDENTIAL” Information or Items. Unless
5 otherwise ordered by the court or permitted in writing by the Designating Party, a
6 Receiving Party may disclose any information or item designated
7 “CONFIDENTIAL” only to:

8 (a) the Receiving Party’s Outside Counsel of Record in this Action, as
9 well as employees of said Outside Counsel of Record to whom it is reasonably
10 necessary to disclose the information for this Action;

11 (b) the officers, directors, and employees (including House Counsel) of
12 the Receiving Party or its affiliates to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for
13 this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgement and Agreement to Be
14 Bound” (Exhibit A);

15 (c) Experts (as defined in this Order) of the Receiving Party to whom
16 disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have signed the
17 “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

18 (d) the court and its personnel;

19 (e) private court reporters and their staff to whom disclosure is reasonably
20 necessary for this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and
21 Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

22 (f) professional jury or trial consultants, mock jurors, and Professional
23 Vendors to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have
24 signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

25 (g) the author or recipient of a document containing the information or a
26 custodian or other person who otherwise possessed or knew the information;
27

(h) during their depositions, witnesses, and attorneys for witnesses, in the Action to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary provided: (1) the deposing party requests that the witness sign the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A); and (2) they will not be permitted to keep any confidential information unless they sign the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A), unless otherwise agreed by the Designating Party or ordered by the court. Pages of transcribed deposition testimony or exhibits to depositions that reveal Protected Material may be separately bound by the court reporter and may not be disclosed to anyone except as permitted under this Protective Order;

(i) any mediator or settlement officer, and their supporting personnel, mutually agreed upon by any of the parties engaged in settlement discussions; and

(j) Plaintiffs to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgement and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A).

7.3 Disclosure of “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” Information or Items. Unless otherwise ordered by the court or permitted in writing by the Designating Party, a Receiving Party may disclose any information or item designated “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” only to:

(a) the Receiving Party’s Outside Counsel of Record in this Action, as well as employees of said Outside Counsel of Record to whom it is reasonably necessary to disclose the information for this Action;

(b) the House Counsel of the Receiving Party or its affiliates to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

(c) Experts (as defined in this Order) of the Receiving Party to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

(d) the court and its personnel;

(e) private court reporters and their staff to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

(f) professional jury or trial consultants, mock jurors, and Professional Vendors to whom disclosure is reasonably necessary for this Action and who have signed the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A);

(g) the author or recipient of a document containing the information or a custodian or other person who otherwise possessed or knew the information; and

(h) any mediator or settlement officer, and their supporting personnel, mutually agreed upon by any of the parties engaged in settlement discussions.

8. PROTECTED MATERIAL SUBPOENAED OR ORDERED
PRODUCED IN OTHER LITIGATION

If a Party is served with a subpoena or a court order issued in other litigation that compels disclosure of any information or items designated in this Action by another Party as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY,” that Party must:

(a) promptly notify in writing the Designating Party. Such notification shall include a copy of the subpoena or court order unless prohibited by law;

(b) promptly notify in writing the party who caused the subpoena or order to issue in the other litigation that some or all of the material covered by the subpoena or order is subject to this Protective Order. Such notification shall include a copy of this Protective Order; and

(c) cooperate with respect to all reasonable procedures sought to be pursued by the Designating Party whose Protected Material may be affected.

If the Designating Party timely seeks a protective order, the Party served with the subpoena or court order shall not produce any information designated in this action as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY” before a determination by the court from which the subpoena or order issued, unless the Party has obtained the Designating Party’s permission, or unless otherwise required by the law or court order. The Designating Party shall bear the burden and expense of seeking protection in that court of its confidential material and nothing in these provisions should be construed as authorizing or encouraging a Receiving Party in this Action to disobey a lawful directive from another court.

9. A NON-PARTY’S PROTECTED MATERIAL SOUGHT TO BE PRODUCED IN THIS LITIGATION

(a) The terms of this Order are applicable to information produced by a Non-Party in this Action and designated as “CONFIDENTIAL” or “HIGHLY CONFIDENTIAL - ATTORNEYS’ EYES ONLY.” Such information produced by Non-Parties in connection with this litigation is protected by the remedies and relief provided by this Order. Nothing in these provisions should be construed as prohibiting a Non-Party from seeking additional protections.

(b) In the event that a Party is required, by a valid discovery request, to produce a Non-Party’s confidential information in its possession, and the Party is subject to an agreement with the Non-Party not to produce the Non-Party’s confidential information, then the Party shall:

(1) promptly notify in writing the Requesting Party and the Non-Party that some or all of the information requested is subject to a confidentiality agreement with a Non-Party;

(2) promptly provide the Non-Party with a copy of the Protective Order in this Action, the relevant discovery request(s), and a reasonably specific description of the information requested; and

(3) make the information requested available for inspection by the Non-Party, if requested.

(c) If a Non-Party represented by counsel fails to commence the process called for by Local Civil Rule 37, et seq. within 14 days of receiving the notice and accompanying information or fails contemporaneously to notify the Receiving Party that it has done so, the Receiving Party may produce the Non-Party's confidential information responsive to the discovery request. If an unrepresented Non-Party fails to seek a protective order from this court within 14 days of receiving the notice and accompanying information, the Receiving Party may produce the Non-Party's confidential information responsive to the discovery request. If the Non-Party timely seeks a protective order, the Receiving Party shall not produce any information in its possession or control that is subject to the confidentiality agreement with the Non-Party before a determination by the court unless otherwise required by the law or court order. Absent a court order to the contrary, the Non-Party shall bear the burden and expense of seeking protection in this court of its Protected Material.

10. UNAUTHORIZED DISCLOSURE OF PROTECTED MATERIAL

If a Receiving Party learns that, by inadvertence or otherwise, it has disclosed Protected Material to any person or in any circumstance not authorized under this Protective Order, the Receiving Party must immediately (a) notify in writing the Designating Party of the unauthorized disclosures, (b) use its best efforts to retrieve all unauthorized copies of the Protected Material, (c) inform the person or persons to whom unauthorized disclosures were made of all the terms of this Order, and

(d) request such person or persons to execute the “Acknowledgment and Agreement to Be Bound” (Exhibit A).

11. INADVERTENT PRODUCTION OF PRIVILEGED OR OTHERWISE PROTECTED MATERIAL

When a Producing Party gives notice to Receiving Parties that certain inadvertently produced material is subject to a claim of privilege or other protection, the obligations of the Receiving Parties are those set forth in Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 26(b)(5)(B). This provision is not intended to modify whatever procedure may be established in an e-discovery order that provides for production without prior privilege review.

12. MISCELLANEOUS

12.1 Right to Further Relief. Nothing in this Order abridges the right of any person to seek its modification by the Court in the future.

12.2 Right to Assert Other Objections. No Party waives any right it otherwise would have to object to disclosing or producing any information or item on any ground not addressed in this Protective Order. Similarly, no Party waives any right to object on any ground to use in evidence of any of the material covered by this Protective Order.

12.3 Filing Protected Material. A Party that seeks to file under seal any Protected Material must comply with Local Civil Rule 5-g and with any pertinent orders of the assigned District Judge and Magistrate Judge. Protected Material may only be filed under seal pursuant to a court order authorizing the sealing of the specific Protected Material at issue. If a Party’s request to file Protected Material

under seal is denied by the court, then the Receiving Party may file the information in the public record unless (a) otherwise instructed by the court or (b) if the Receiving Party receives notice from the Designating Party that it intends to seek reconsideration of the court's order denying the request to file the Protected Materials under seal and such motion for reconsideration is filed prior to the time limit imposed by the court for filing the information in the public record.

12.4 Redaction of Protected Material Containing Personal Confidential Information Before Filing. The Parties contemplate that they may produce Protected Material that contains individual's personal confidential information pursuant to the terms of this Order. Prior to filing any such Protected Material in any Court, the filer must comply with Local Civil Rule 5.2-1 and Federal Rule of Civil Procedure 5.2 by redacting any sensitive and private information, including but not limited to personal identifying information on any medical records, passport numbers, driver license numbers, full home addresses, and financial account numbers.

13. FINAL DISPOSITION

After the final disposition of this Action, as defined in Section 4, within 60 days of a written request by the Designating Party, each Receiving Party must return all Protected Material to the Producing Party or destroy such material. As used in this subdivision, "all Protected Material" includes all copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries, and any other format reproducing or capturing any of the Protected Material. Whether the Protected Material is returned or destroyed, the Receiving Party must submit a written certification to the Producing Party (and, if not the same person or entity, to the Designating Party) by the 60-day deadline that (1) identifies (by category, where appropriate) all the Protected Material that was returned or destroyed and (2) affirms that the Receiving Party has not retained any copies, abstracts, compilations, summaries or any other format reproducing or capturing any

of the Protected Material. Notwithstanding this provision, Counsel are entitled to retain an archival copy of all pleadings, motion papers, trial, deposition, and hearing transcripts, legal memoranda, correspondence, deposition and trial exhibits, expert reports, attorney work product, and consultant and expert work product, even if such materials contain Protected Material. Any such archival copies that contain or constitute Protected Material remain subject to this Protective Order as set forth in Section 4.

14. Any violation of this Order may be punished by any and all appropriate measures including, without limitation, contempt proceedings and/or monetary sanctions.

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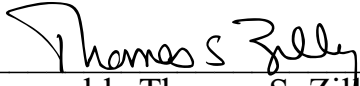
