2. I am a Senior Master Sergeant in the United States Air Force Reserve. I have known Major Margaret Witt for approximately seven years. We serve in the same unit, the 446th Aeromedical Evacuation Squadron ("AES"). We also both live in Spokane, Washington. I am a full time professional Firefighter for the City of Spokane. Margie was a volunteer with Spokane County Fire District 8.

I have been a member of the 446th /40th AES (Unit was originally the 40th 3. AES until sometime in 1995/96 when it was re-designated the 446th AES) since 1991. The 446th is one of three Aeromedical Evacuation Squadrons in the western United States. My current assignment is Superintendent of Operations for the 446th AES. position I am responsible for scheduling all flight operations for the 446th AES at McChord. These flights include training flights, in which members practice the evacuation of injured or ill military and DOD personnel in exercises designed to simulate battlefield extractions. I am also responsible for scheduling and coordinating real-world flights for the transportation of injured and sick patients. Occasionally, we also do urgent real world flights where we are transporting patients with critical life/limb/eyesight problems.

4. I do regular UTA (Unit Training Assembly) duty at McChord Air Force Base. For the past six or seven years, until November of 2004, I was in the habit of seeing Major Witt every UTA weekend when we would take the same UTA pick-up flight from Fairchild Air Force Base to McChord Air Force Base.

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- 5. Up until November of 2004 in the performance of my duties I worked regularly with Major Witt. As head of Standards and Evaluations, Major Witt was responsible for insuring that every person scheduled to fly on a flight was ready for real world deployment; that they were properly trained, certified, vaccinated and in physical condition to depart. I worked with her on the staffing of all scheduled flights.
- 6. In 2003 I was deployed to Seeb Air force Base in Oman as part of a real world deployment. This was during the buildup of forces prior to the start of Operation Iraqi Freedom. During my tour of duty in Oman, I was assigned to Mai. Witt's flight crew where I flew with Major Witt on real world missions, many of which were flights to pick up and transport armed forces personnel injured in Afghanistan and Kuwait in the build-up prior to OIF. We flew many urgent missions in the theater of operations taking critically-wounded, injured and ill U.S. service members out of those areas. As a result of this flight experience with Major Witt, I am extremely familiar with her abilities, knowledge, military skills, and leadership capabilities.
- 7. I have always known Major Witt to be highly professional, skilled and disciplined. I have the utmost trust and confidence in her abilities as a member of the U.S. Air Force and am honored to serve with her as a member of the 446th AES.
- 8. I believe that Major Witt is a highly valuable, well-liked and well-respected member of our Unit. She also plays an important role in ensuring the good order, morale and cohesion of our Unit. She is highly skilled at managing people under her command, and knows how to be inclusive when she leads.

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- 9. Based on my personal observations of Major Witt I can say with confidence that her presence in the Air Force greatly enhances our Unit's combat efficiency and readiness.
- 10. I have routinely witnessed Major Witt interact with her superiors, subordinates and peers. Major Witt sustains strong working relationships with and has the respect of all of the members of our Unit, regardless of rank. In my experience, Major Witt performs her supervisory duties successfully and professionally. Major Witt's strong relationships help maintain an effective chain of command in our Unit.
- 11. I have had occasion to witness Major Witt's performance of her duties under extremely stressful conditions. For example, I flew with her from Seeb Air Base in Oman to Kuwait and from there to Germany, on a mission involving the transportation of injured service members. These were extremely long and stressful missions during which she coordinated the transportation of the injured flawlessly. I also had occasion to see her respond in an emergency situation. While at Seeb AB Oman, there was a fire in a latrine and a service member was blinded by the smoke. Maj. Witt immediately took charge of the situation, treated the service member when no other help was immediately available, and in my opinion probably saved his eyesight. On another occasion while flying on a Contract commercial flight back to the United States a civilian DOD employee on the flight suffered possible Cardiogenic shock, and collapsed on the aircraft while in-flight. Maj. Witt went into action and saved his life.

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11. I have always found Major Witt to be strong, professional and disciplined military officer. I felt fortunate to serve with her in the Southwest Asia Theater of operations and would welcome the opportunity to serve with her again, anywhere in the world, in any conditions.

12. During the summer of 2004, Major Witt told me that she was advised she was under investigation for commission of homosexual acts. Later, in November of 2004, when she failed to show up for our regular monthly UTA flight from Fairchild to McChord, I gave her a call and asked her what was going on. She told me she was not coming to McChord for the monthly UTA. She told me that Colonel Moore-Harbert and Major Verna Madison had informed her that Colonel Walker had initiated separation proceedings against her. I later spoke to Colonel Moore-Harbert about this, and she told me that informing Major Witt of Colonel Walker's separation action was the hardest thing she ever had to do in the Air Force. Colonel Moore-Harbert told me that she cried when she told Major Witt of Colonel Walker's action.

13. I also have talked to Major Verna Madison about this matter. Major Madison told me that she was so upset about Colonel Walker's decision that she felt like taking off her uniform.

Many other people in the 446th AES have approached me asking about the 14. decision to initiate separation proceedings against Major Witt, and they are all upset and angry. In my opinion, if command were to announce to the entire squadron that Major Witt was a lesbian, and that nevertheless the decision had been made to retain her in the

Air Force, Major Witt's return to the 446th AES would not have any negative impact upon unit morale, discipline, or combat readiness.

- 15. On the contrary, I think most people would be completely indifferent to the fact that she is a lesbian, and I cannot think of a single person who would object to her return to the unit. In my opinion, even the most conservative people in the unit would not have any problem with her return to duty.
- 16. I believe the morale of the 446th AES has already been damaged by the decision to prohibit her from reporting for reserve duty, and that it would only be further harmed if her separation from the Air Force was accomplished.
- 17. Nor do I believe that Major Witt's continued presence in the U.S. Air Force, or specifically in our Unit, would jeopardize recruiting efforts. In fact, I am aware of the fact that Major Witt was selected to appear on various U.S. Air Force recruiting posters, brochures and other materials precisely because she exemplified the qualities that the U.S. Air Force sought in recruits. I personally believe that Major Witt exemplifies the qualities that makes one a good and valuable member of the U.S. Air Force.
- 18. In all the time that I have known Major Witt and served with her, I have never seen or heard of anyone in the armed forces expressing any problem with her. I have never heard anyone complain about her. I have never heard anyone say that they wished she was not a member of their unit. I have never heard of any incident where she caused a discipline or morale problem.

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- 19. It is important to recognize how significant it is that Major Witt was selected to be the chief of Standards and Evaluations for the 446th AES. The person selected to be the head of StanEval has to be "the best of the best." That is why they are selected for that position. The person who evaluates the performance of others has to be extremely highly regarded by the rest of the unit in order to perform the evaluation job successfully. That is why Major Witt was selected for the position because she is so uniformly highly regarded by everyone in the unit.
- 20. In sum, I firmly believe that discharging Major Witt from the U.S. Air Force would be extremely detrimental to the Air Force. The 446th AES' morale, cohesion and good order would be severely jeopardized if Major Witt is discharged. Moreover, it would be downright stupid to discharge such a skilled and knowledgeable officer, especially in a time of war when people with her level of military skill and professionalism are so badly needed, and in such short supply.
