ORDER TO SHOW CAUSE AND RE-  
NOTING PENDING MOTIONS

15 Before the Court are: (1) Plaintiff's Motion for Service (Dkt. 190); (2) Plaintiff's Motion  
16 for Substitution (Dkt. 191); (3) Defendants' Motion for Summary Judgment (Dkt. 203); (4)  
17 Plaintiff's Motion for Leave to File Excess Pages (Dkt. 208); (5) Plaintiff's Motion to Dismiss  
18 Party (Dkt. 207); and (6) Plaintiff's Motion to Issue Subpoena (Dkt. 209).

19 On March 28, 2017, Plaintiff filed a Notice of Appeal, appealing the Order Denying  
20 Plaintiff's Motion for Preliminary Injunction. Dkts. 137, 163, 174, 175, 180. Plaintiff's appeal is  
21 currently pending before the Ninth Circuit. See Dkt. 180; Ninth Circuit Case No. 17-35275.

22 The district court has broad discretion to decide whether a stay is appropriate to "promote  
23 economy of time and effort for itself, for counsel, and for litigants." *Filtrol Corp. v. Kelleher*,

1 467 F.2d 242, 244 (9th Cir. 1972) (quotations and citations omitted). *Clinton v. Jones*, 520 U.S.  
2 681, 706–07 (1997) (“The District Court has broad discretion to stay proceedings as an incident  
3 to its power to control its own docket.”). “A trial court may, with propriety, find it is efficient for  
4 its own docket and the fairest course for the parties to enter a stay of an action before it, pending  
5 resolution of independent proceedings which bear upon the case.” *Mediterranean Enterprises,*  
6 *Inc. v. Ssangyong Corp.*, 708 F.2d 1458, 1465 (9th Cir. 1983); *Leyva v. Certified Grocers of*  
7 *California Ltd.*, 593 F.2d 857, 863–64 (9th Cir.1979); *Ass'n of Irrigated Residents v. Fred*  
8 *Schakel Dairy*, 634 F. Supp. 2d 1081, 1094 (E.D. Cal. 2008); *Jenkins v. Vail*, 2009 WL 3415902,  
9 at \*1 (E.D. Wash. Oct. 21, 2009) (staying motion for summary judgment pending Court of  
10 Appeals ruling on order denying motion for temporary restraining order).

11 Here, several of the issues raised in Defendants’ Second Motion for Summary Judgment  
12 are the same issues addressed by the Court in its Order Denying Plaintiff’s Motion for  
13 Preliminary Injunction. Because the Ninth Circuit’s ruling on the interlocutory appeal could  
14 impact the Court's disposition of the pending proceedings, waiting until the issues on appeal are  
15 decided will avoid potential unnecessary litigation and provide direction to this Court. See  
16 *Jenkins*, 2009 WL 3415902 at 1. Thus, the Court finds a stay of the entire matter, including  
17 discovery, pending the Ninth Circuit’s decision on appeal could serve the interests of fairness  
18 and “promote economy of time and effort” for the Court and the parties. *Kelleher*, 467 F.2d at  
19 244.

20 Accordingly, the parties are directed to show cause on or before June 30, 2017 why the  
21 case should not be stayed, pending the outcome of Plaintiff’s appeal of the Order Denying  
22 Plaintiff’s Motion for Preliminary Injunction.
