ORDER DIRECTING SERVICE OF
CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLAINT UPON
DEFENDANT SENOVIA RIVAS

11 This is a civil rights action brought pursuant to 42 U.S.C. § 1983. Plaintiff is proceeding
12 with this action *pro se* and *in forma pauperis*. The Court, having received contact information
13 under seal for the previously un-served defendant identified by plaintiff as “nurse Senovia,”
14 hereby ORDERS as follows:

15 (1) Correction of Name of Defendant:

16 The Clerk is directed to change the name of “defendant Senovia” in the docket for this
17 matter to “Senovia Rivas.”

18 (2) Service by Clerk

19 The Clerk is directed to send the following by first class mail to defendant Senovia Rivas
20 at the address identified under seal in defendants’ Statement Regarding Last Known Address of
21 Defendant Senovia, Dkt. 38: a copy of plaintiff’s Amended Complaint and its attachments, Dkt.
22 14, a copy of plaintiff’s letter correcting deficiencies in the complaint and its attachments, Dkt.
23 15, a copy of this Order, a copy of the Court’s Scheduling Order issued contemporaneously with
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1 this Order, two copies of the notice of lawsuit and request for waiver of service of summons, a
2 waiver of service of summons, and a return envelope, postage prepaid, addressed to the Clerk's
3 Office.

4 (3) Response Required

5 Defendant shall have **thirty (30) days** within which to return the enclosed waiver of
6 service of summons. A defendant who timely returns the signed waiver shall have **sixty (60)**
7 **days** after the date designated on the notice of lawsuit to file and serve an answer to the
8 complaint or a motion permitted under Rule 12 of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure.

9 A defendant who fails to timely return the signed waiver will be personally served with a
10 summons and complaint, and may be required to pay the full costs of such service, pursuant to
11 Rule 4(d)(2) of the Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. A defendant who has been personally
12 served shall file an answer or motion permitted under Rule 12 within **thirty (30) days** after
13 service.

14 (4) Filing and Service by Parties, Generally

15 All attorneys admitted to practice before this Court are required to file documents
16 electronically via the Court's CM/ECF system. Counsel are directed to the Court's website,
17 www.wawd.uscourts.gov, for a detailed description of the requirements for filing via CM/ECF.
18 All non-attorneys, such as *pro se* parties and/or prisoners, may continue to file a paper original
19 with the Clerk. All filings, whether filed electronically or in traditional paper format, must
20 indicate in the upper right hand corner the name of the magistrate judge to whom the document
21 is directed.

22 For any party filing electronically, when the total of all pages of a filing exceeds fifty
23 (50) pages in length, a paper copy of the document (with tabs or other organizing aids as
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1 necessary) shall be delivered to the Clerk’s Office for chambers. The chambers copy must be
2 clearly marked with the words “Courtesy Copy of Electronic Filing for Chambers.”

3 Any document filed with the Court must be accompanied by proof that it has been served
4 upon all parties that have entered a notice of appearance in the underlying matter.

5 (5) Motions, Generally

6 Any request for court action shall be set forth in a motion, properly filed and served.
7 Pursuant to LCR 7(b), any argument being offered in support of a motion shall be submitted as a
8 part of the motion itself and not in a separate document. The motion shall include in its caption
9 (immediately below the title of the motion) a designation of the date the motion is to be noted for
10 consideration upon the Court’s motion calendar.

11 Stipulated and agreed motions, motions to file over-length motions or briefs, motions for
12 reconsideration, joint submissions pursuant to the option procedure established in LCR 37(a)(2),
13 motions for default, requests for the clerk to enter default judgment, and motions for the court to
14 enter default judgment where the opposing party has not appeared shall be noted for
15 consideration on the day they are filed. *See* LCR 7(d)(1). All other non-dispositive motions
16 shall be noted for consideration no earlier than the third Friday following filing and service of the
17 motion. *See* LCR 7(d)(3). All dispositive motions shall be noted for consideration no earlier
18 than the fourth Friday following filing and service of the motion. *Id.*

19 For electronic filers, all briefs and affidavits in opposition to either a dispositive or non-
20 dispositive motion shall be filed and served not later than 11:59 p.m. on the Monday
21 immediately preceding the date designated for consideration of the motion. If a party (i.e. a *pro*
22 *se* litigant and/or prisoner) files a paper original, that opposition must be received in the Clerk’s
23 office by 4:30 p.m. on the Monday preceding the date of consideration.

1 The party making the motion may file and serve, not later than 11:59 p.m. (if filing
2 electronically) or 4:30 p.m. (if filing a paper original with the Clerk's office) on the date
3 designated for consideration of the motion, a reply to the opposing party's briefs and affidavits.

4 (6) Motions to Dismiss and Motions for Summary Judgment

5 Parties filing motions to dismiss pursuant to Rule 12 of the Federal Rules of Civil
6 Procedure and motions for summary judgment pursuant to Rule 56 of the Federal Rules of Civil
7 Procedure should acquaint themselves with those rules. As noted above, these motions shall be
8 noted for consideration no earlier than the fourth Friday following filing and service of the
9 motion.

10 Defendants filing motions to dismiss based on a failure to exhaust or motions for
11 summary judgment are advised that they MUST serve a *Rand* notice concurrently with motions to
12 dismiss based on a failure to exhaust and motions for summary judgment so that *pro se* prisoner
13 plaintiffs will have fair, timely and adequate notice of what is required of them in order to
14 oppose those motions. *Woods v. Carey*, 684 F.3d 934, 941 (9th Cir. 2012). The Ninth Circuit
15 has set forth model language for such notices:

16 A motion for summary judgment under Rule 56 of the Federal Rules of
17 Civil Procedure will, if granted, end your case.

18 Rule 56 tells you what you must do in order to oppose a motion for summary
19 judgment. Generally, summary judgment must be granted when there is no
20 genuine issue of material fact – that is, if there is no real dispute about any
21 fact that would affect the result of your case, the party who asked for
22 summary judgment is entitled to judgment as a matter of law, which will
23 end your case. When a party you are suing makes a motion for summary
24 judgment that is properly supported by declarations (or other sworn
25 testimony), you cannot simply rely on what your complaint says. Instead,
**you must set out specific facts in declarations, depositions, answers to
interrogatories, or authenticated documents, as provided in Rule 56(e),
that contradict the facts shown in the defendant's declarations and
documents and show that there is a genuine issue of material fact for
trial. If you do not submit your own evidence in opposition, summary**

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judgment, if appropriate, may be entered against you. If summary judgment is granted, your case will be dismissed and there will be no trial.

Rand v. Rowland, 154 F.3d 952, 963 (9th Cir. 1998) (emphasis added.)

Defendants who fail to file and serve the required *Rand* notice on plaintiff may have their motion stricken from the Court’s calendar with leave to re-file.

(7) Direct Communications with District Judge or Magistrate Judge

No direct communication is to take place with the District Judge or Magistrate Judge with regard to this case. All relevant information and papers are to be directed to the Clerk.

(8) The Clerk is directed to send copies of this Order and of the Court’s *pro se* instruction sheet to plaintiff.
