PER CURIAM.

We have for review <u>State v. Perez-Garcia</u>, 917 So. 2d 894 (Fla. 3d DCA 2005), in which the Third District Court of Appeal expressly relied upon the Second District Court of Appeal's decision in <u>Hilton v. State</u>, 901 So. 2d 155 (Fla. 2d DCA 2005) (en banc), <u>quashed</u>, 961 So. 2d 284 (Fla. 2007). At the time the Third District issued its decision in <u>Perez-Garcia</u>, <u>Hilton</u> was pending review in this Court. We have jurisdiction. <u>See</u> art. V, § 3(b)(3), Fla. Const.; <u>Jollie v. State</u>, 405 So. 2d 418 (Fla. 1981).

We stayed proceedings in this case pending our disposition of <u>Hilton</u>. <u>See</u>

<u>Hilton v. State</u>, 961 So. 2d 284 (Fla. 2007) (quashing the Second District's

decision in <u>Hilton</u>, upon which the Third District had relied in <u>Perez-Garcia</u>). When our decision in <u>Hilton</u> became final, we issued an order directing petitioner to show cause why <u>Hilton</u> is not controlling in this case, and thus why the Court should not decline to accept jurisdiction. Upon considering petitioner's response and respondent's reply thereto, we have determined to grant the petition for review in the present case, quash, and remand for reconsideration in light of our decision in <u>Hilton</u>.

Accordingly, we grant the petition for review in the present case. The decision under review is quashed and this matter is remanded to the Third District for reconsideration upon application of this Court's decision in Hilton.

It is so ordered.

WELLS, J., dissenting.

I dissent from the majority's summary quashing of the Third District Court of Appeal's decision in this case.

First, this case is distinguishable from <u>Hilton v. State</u>, 961 So. 2d 284 (Fla. 2007). <u>Hilton</u> involved a cracked windshield on the nondriver's side of a vehicle. Here, the case concerns an inoperable taillight.

Second, clearly the district court expressly adhered to the objective test for vehicle stops in accord with Whren v. United States, 517 U.S. 806 (1996), and Dobrin v. Florida Department of Highway Safety & Motor Vehicles, 874 So. 2d 1171, 1174 (Fla. 2004).

In this case, the district court logically concluded as a matter of law in its straightforward holding, that an inoperable left rear taillight is an objectively "unsafe condition," prohibited by section 316.610, Florida Statutes (2003). This legal conclusion is not in conflict with <u>Hilton</u>, <u>Dobrin</u>, or any other case decided by this Court or any other district court.
